Page 23, Environmental Checklist The following checklist item was changed from a rating of a "No Impact" to a "Less-Than-Significant Impact": XVII. Mandatory Findings of Significance (b). This finding was changed based on comments provided by the Contra Costa Water District, and a discussion is added to page 42 (as noted below).

Page 42

4.14 Mandatory Findings of Significance

The Park District has considered the potential impact of the proposed marsh restoration in conjunction with other proposed marsh restoration projects and finds that the project will have a less-than-significant impact on the water quality in on Contra Costa Water District intakes at Mallard Slough, Rock Slough, and Old River. This finding is based on the following reasoning:

- a) CALFED, a state and federal initiative with 4 major objectives (including improving the ecological functioning of the Bay-Delta [including marsh restoration], improving the water supply reliability, protecting drinking water, and providing for the long-term protection and maintenance of existing levees), in its Record of Decision notes: "In considering effects from the CALFED Program together with the effects of other similar projects, the cumulative impact analysis did not identify any additional effects that individually would be minor, but [that would be] collectively significant." CALFED found the mitigations it adopted at the programmatic level to mitigate for the long-term effects of its entire, broad program were sufficient to mitigate the program's cumulative effects. No additional mitigations were required. (CALFED Bay-Delta Program, *Programmatic Record of Decision*, August 28, 2000, p. 29).
- b) The Park District proposal is much smaller in scope than CALFED's program. It will affect 16 acres (in comparison with the 18,000 acres of the Suisun and Honker Bay areas), and Park District staff believes that a project of this scale will not have a considerable cumulative impact on water quality. It believes that the mitigations, as outlined in Section 4.7, are sufficient to mitigate long-term and cumulative impacts to water quality. Permitting requirements by regulatory agencies including the Regional Water Quality Control Board, the ACOE, and the California Department of Fish and Game will ensure that the Park District adheres to the required water quality standards, as required by law.

c) The CALFED Program is new, and the precise location and extent of all CALFED-sponsored proposed marsh restoration projects that will be fully funded and implemented are not reasonably foreseeable, and therefore, are speculative at this time.

Page 5, paragraph 2 and page 38, paragraph 2

Mitigation: Prior to construction activities finalizing the design of the marsh restoration project, a materials characterization report shall be prepared and submitted to the appropriate regulatory agencies. Testing will be conducted on both the materials to be moved and on materials that will be exposed after excavation has been completed. If required, a water quality plan shall be prepared and submitted to the RWQCB.

Page 27, Table B - Special-Status Wildlife

For California clapper rail, under "Likelihood of Occurrence" replace Possible but unlikely. with Possible.

Page 31, paragraph 6

California clapper rail: This species is normally found in the tidal marsh and in the upland transitional areas within the San Francisco Bay estuary. Historical and current distribution indicate that they are unlikely to occur on the site. They remain unlikely to occur after marsh restoration. Due to California clapper rail occurrence in the vicinity of the project, the USFWS believes this species occurs within the proposed project area or has the ability to disperse to the site in the future. California clapper rail will benefit from the proposed increase in tidal marsh and upland areas.

Tri-Delta Transit bus line 392 provides bus service between the Shore Acres neighborhood and Pittsburg, passing within 1/2 mile of Bay Point Regional Shoreline. The park would also be located about three (3) miles from the Pittsburg/Bay Point BART station. Tri-Delta Transit currently provides bus service from the BART Station into the Shore Acres neighborhood on bus line 389 (weekdays) and 392 (weekends). Line 389 travels up Port Chicago Highway to Pacifica Avenue, and would pass within 1/2 mile of the Bay Point Regional Shoreline. Park users could take advantage of these transit opportunities to get to the park by travelling via BART and bike or by the Tri-Delta Transit bus service. This would be especially useful for transit-dependent people and others who do not own a car. The Park District also has an opportunity here to encourage non-automobile modes of transportation.

Page 22, Table B (California clapper rail)

Correction as follows:

"Possible but unlikely. Dense stands of tidal cattail-bulrush marsh on-site provide marginal habitat.

USFWS believes they occur within the project area or have the ability to disperse to the site in the future.⁵ Recorded from about 3 miles east of site.¹¹
